Section 1. TITLE. This local law shall be known as Local Law No. 1 of the Year 2015, a local law imposing a three (3) month moratorium on free standing solar panel installations within the Town of Livingston.

Section 2. LEGISLATIVE INTENT.

The Town of Livingston presently has in effect a Town Zoning Law which has established regulations for building, construction and allowable uses within the town. The Town Board is of the opinion that a period of time is necessary to adequately review the current regulations concerning free standing solar panel installations, and to determine whether additional local regulations are necessary in order to preserve and protect the health, safety and welfare of its residents. Such free standing solar panel installations can be both residential, commercial, large, obtrusive, and can and may pose a hazard and danger to residents by distraction, obstruction, and the power supply systems involved with such installations that may pose a risk. This moratorium will enable town officials to review and comprehensively address the issues involved with free standing solar panel installations that are becoming increasingly popular in our rural community. The town recognizes the potential

benefits and desirability of solar power and renewal energy sources, but determines time and research is necessary to determine how to properly regulate the installations. The Supervisor and Town Board deem this moratorium emergent and immediately necessary for the Town.

Section 3. DEFINITIONS.

Free Standing Solar Panels: A device or combination of devices, structure, or part of a device or structure that transforms direct solar energy into thermal, chemical, or electrical energy. Such devices or installations may be free standing or pole mounted.

Section 4. MORATORIUM

A. The Town Board hereby enacts a moratorium which shall prohibit Free Standing Solar Panels anywhere within the Town.

B. This moratorium shall be in effect for a period of three (3) months from the effective date of this local law and shall expire on the earlier of (i) the date three (3) months from said effective date, unless renewed: or (ii) the enactment by the Town Board of a resolution indicating the Town Board is satisfied that the need for the moratorium no longer exists.

C. This moratorium shall apply to all zoning districts and all real property within the Town.

D. Pursuant to this moratorium, applications that have been submitted to the Town through the planning board / code enforcement officer / zoning enforcement officer shall continue to be processed for free standing solar panels, after enactment, the Town shall not accept any applications for free standing solar panels, nor shall it grant any preliminary or final approval for any site plan or special use permit which includes a free standing solar panel installation as part of the application.

E. Free Standing Solar Panels that have been previously approved are expressly excluded from this moratorium.

Section 5. RELIEF FROM PROVISIONS OF THIS LOCAL LAW.

A. If any owner of property within the Town seeks relief from this moratorium to enable such owner to apply for or seek continued review of, activities otherwise prohibited under this moratorium, such owner shall make application to the Zoning Board.

B. It shall be the burden of the owner for such relief to demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Zoning Board, upon clear and convincing evidence, that an unjust result and extraordinary financial hardship will occur to the property owner if such relief is not granted, and such showing must demonstrate that the proposed activity for which relief is sought shall be consistent with the reasonable and orderly development of the Town.

C. Such relief shall be the subject of a public hearing before said Zoning Board.

D. It shall be within the discretion of the Zoning Board to grant, in whole or in part, or deny, the application for such relief from the terms of this moratorium.

Section 6. PENALTIES.

Any person, partnership, association, corporation, landowner, lessee or licensee which shall construct, reconstruct, relocate, enlarge or modify any site to be used for a free standing solar panel in violation of the provisions of this local law, shall be subject to:

- A. A fine not to exceed One Thousand and 00/100 Dollars (\$1,000.00) per individual and not exceeding Five Thousand and 00/100 Dollars (\$5,000.00) as to a corporation, partnership, or association, or imprisonment for a term not to exceed thirty (30) days, or both;
- B. A civil action inclusive of injunctive relief in favor of the Town to cease any and all such actions which conflict with this local law and, if necessary, to remove any constructions, improvements, or related items or byproducts which may have taken place in violation of this local law.

Section 7. ENFORCEMENT.

This local law shall be enforced by the Zoning Enforcement Officer of the Town of Livingston or such other zoning enforcement individual(s) as designated by the Town Board. It shall be the duty of the enforcement individual(s) to advise the Town Board of all matters pertaining to the enforcement of this local law.

Section 8. VALIDITY & SEVERABILITY.

If any section or part of this local law is declared invalid or unconstitutional, it shall not be held to invalidate or impair the validity, force or effect of any other section of this local law.

Section 9. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This local law shall take effect immediately upon passage and thereafter filed with the New York State Department of State and shall remain in force and effect for a period of three (3) months from the date of passage.

Solar Panel info from Town of Claverack

DEFINITION:

ACCESSORY SOLAR PANELS: A device or combination of devices, structure, or part of a device or structure that transforms direct solar energy into thermal, chemical, or electrical energy.

USE TABLE:

Accessory Solar Panels; use by residences and business / Pole Mounted / Free Standing, shall be allowable as a Special Exception Use in all districts.

Accessory Solar Panels; use by residences and business / Roof Mounted, shall be a permitted use without the requirement for site plan approval.

SUPPLEMENTAL REGULATIONS

§ 15.3.21 Solar Panels, Accessory

A. Requirements for Roof Mounted System:

- i. An engineer or architect report verifying roof will support the system load.
- ii. Electrical schematic showing main system components and where they are physically located.
- iii. Description of cable routing from the solar array to the DC disconnect.
- iv. Simple plot plan showing which building on the property is being used.

B. Requirements for Pole Mount or Remote Mount System:

- i. Electrical schematic showing main system components and where they are physically located, including batteries (if included in the installation).
- ii. DC disconnect to be located externally (and labeled) as near the utility meter as possible.
- iii. If DC disconnect cannot be located within six feet of the utility meter, a label at the meter will indicate the location of the external disconnect, which shall also be labeled.
- iv. Remote arrays should also have a DC disconnect at the location of the array. Some remote arrays may be roof mounted on a different building than the one using the power from the array.
